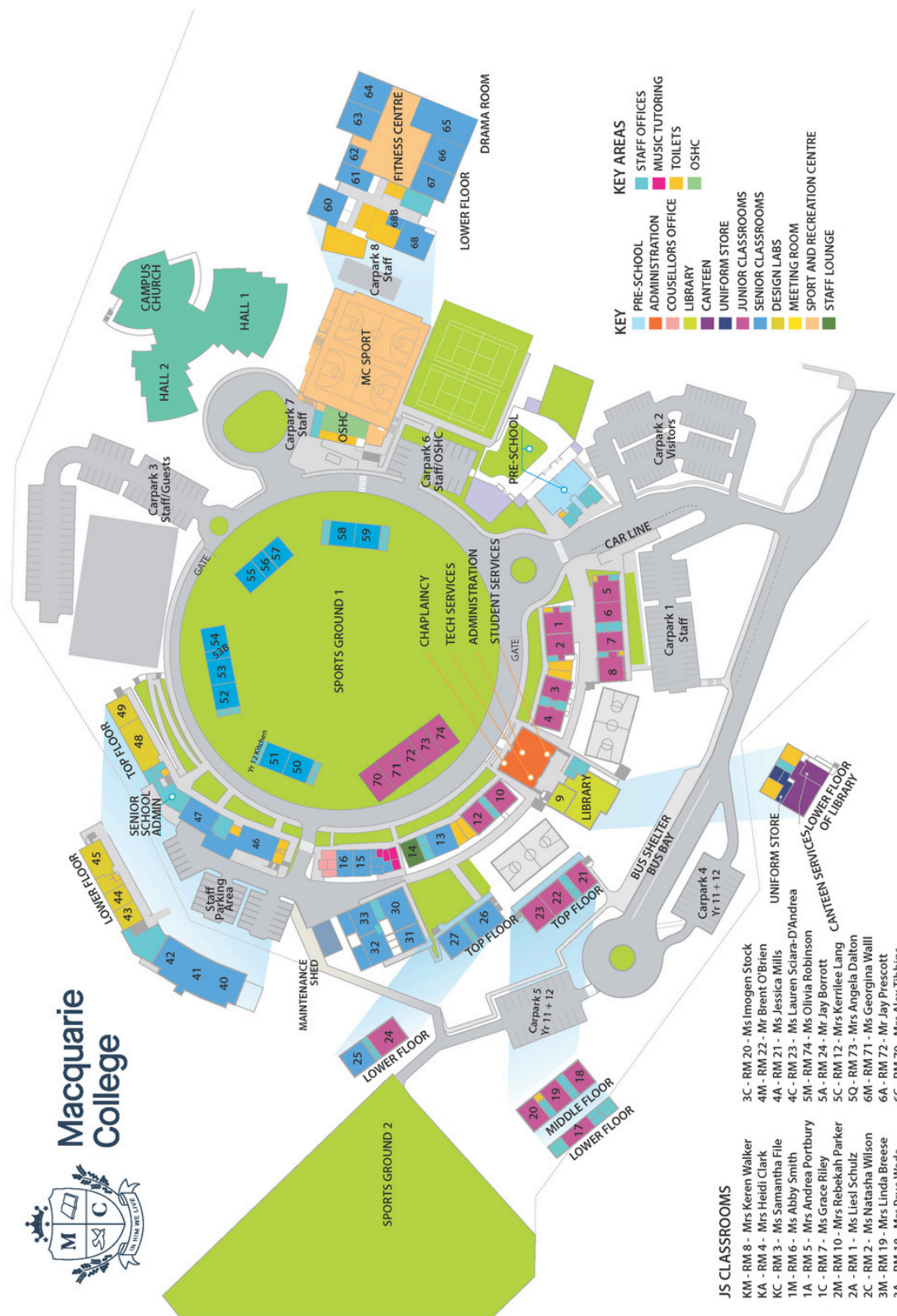

House & vertical homerooms

Vertical homerooms began at Macquarie College in 2022. The vertical homerooms are intentionally small groupings of approximately 15 -18 students. These homeroom groups are grouped vertically, so that a diverse range of age groups across Yrs 7-12 are represented, allowing for intentional peer mentoring of students both academically and relationally, as well the development of a coaching-based leadership structure within the student body.

Our vertical homegroups are based on our three house groups: Charlton, Dobell and Shortland. There are approximately 180 students in each house, with around 11 homeroom groups in each house. As the school continues to grow, and in order to keep house groups at a size that is beneficial to a relational approach, the growth of houses may occur.

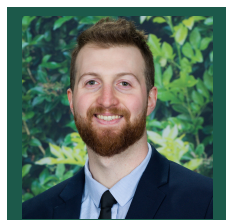

MCX Learning Program

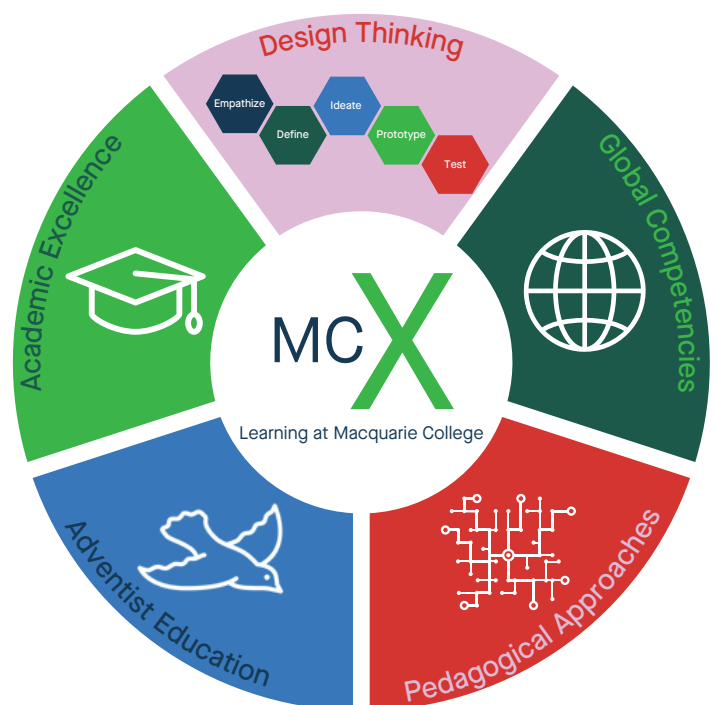
MCX is a whole school future-focused learning program, equipping young people with the skills and dispositions to succeed in the communities and workplaces of the future.

MCX describes our K-12 learning program at Macquarie College. MC is an abbreviation for Macquarie College and the X represents the multiplicity of teaching approaches that exist when designing learning pathways for our K-12 young people. It is a comprehensive approach to learning which is designed by courageous and adaptive MC educators.

Iterations of the MCX program include, but are not limited to: explicit/direct instruction, collaborative project work, individual learner research and exploration, play-based learning, design lab exploration and prototyping and the infusion of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals.

At MC we do not believe that current credentialing (academic excellence) and the global competencies (teaching the skills to design solutions to real-world challenges) are in competition. It is not one or the other, instead, it can, in fact, be both.

MC aspires to co-evolve a new exemplar of future-focused schooling which mobilises K-12 learners by building their adaptive capacity to navigate complex challenges and opportunities – both present and yet to be imagined.



The MCX Program is built upon 5 pillars:

Pillar 1: Adventist Education

Educators who authentically reflect the character of Christ and infuse the values and ethos of Adventist Education throughout all elements of their practice.

Pillar 2: Academic Excellence

Academic excellence in the context of current credentialing which is designed by courageous and adaptive educators who are themselves lifelong learners and inspire their students through best-practice application of the AITSL Standards and NESA syllabi.

Pillar 3: Design Thinking

Design thinking inspired by the Stanford University d.school methodology.

Pillar 4: Global Competencies

Making the Global Competencies tangible and attainable through learning which is relevant to real life and equips young people

Pillar 5: Pedagogical Approaches

Understanding that the X in MCX represents the multiplicity of teaching and learning approaches that exist when designing pedagogical pathways that equip young people to solve complex, real-world challenges.

Student voice & choice

Student voice and choice at Macquarie College is also central to future-focused learning. We believe that learning improves when students are engaged, and that engagement is enhanced through voice and choice. In the Senior School this is reflected in programs where students have substantial choices in their learning directions. In Years 9 and 10, students choose from a variety of electives, many of which are locally designed for MC students specifically. It is also possible for students to design a subject of their own choosing as one of their electives. Year 11 and 12 students have a considerable range of subjects to choose from in order to ensure their engagement in their learning.



CAPA

Creative & Performing Arts

Macquarie College prides itself on its outstanding Creative and Performing Arts program, providing opportunities for students in the areas of music, drama and visual arts.

Music

Music in our senior school is offered at all levels, from mandatory courses in Years 7 and 8, through to extension level in Year 12. Students study a variety of music and develop abilities in performance, musicology, aural and composition. These abilities include familiarisation with music software for composition, performance and recording, and performance skills such as standing on stage and running lights and sound from backstage.

Drama

As a faculty, we continually adapt and change with technology, and students utilise film and production forms such as lighting and sound to enhance or differentiate their work. The students present their projects at performance nights, chapel programs, CAPA nights and major productions throughout the year.

Visual Arts

During visual art lessons, students are given a range of media to experiment with in order to choose their area of expertise to extend to major artworks. They also explore art history and visit a variety of locations to view art in the real world and discuss the importance of visual arts as a stand-alone art form. Students will have the opportunity to display their works both inside and outside of the school, as well as delve into the digital community through the CAPA Instagram page.



Get involved

Stage Band

Stage band is an extension ensemble in the school featuring more advanced players. They explore repertoire in jazz and funk styles and students are expected to learn this far more quickly. While predominantly an instrumental ensemble, there is also an opportunity for vocalists to feature within this group.

Vocal Ensemble

Vocal ensemble is open to all students from Years 7 to 12. Repertoire for this ensemble is mostly based around popular music, in a variety of genres. Part singing is taught to students, but the focus is on allowing students to sing in a group. An advanced group will be selected for students who wish to sing in a more challenging ensemble.

Chapel Band

Our Chapel band is a great opportunity for senior students to be involved in sharing pieces of music during our weekly Chapel programmes. Songs can range from Praise & Worship to mainstream, focusing on a positive, uplifting message. Students don't need to be in any music classes to perform.



Sport

We offer our Senior School students an outstanding school sports program, where they have many opportunities to participate in a wide range of sporting endeavours.

Macquarie College is a member of the Hunter Region Independent Schools sport association (HRIS), the Association of Independent Coeducational Schools (AICES), and the Combined Independent Schools sport association (CIS). Our College athletes regularly attain excellent results in regional sport carnivals against other much larger schools in the Hunter region. We deliver an integrated approach to sport, where all sport classes are conducted by trained physical education specialists. Our PDHPE program focuses not only on traditional development of sporting processes and skills, but facilitates student learning in elite athlete performance, the psychology of sport and managing personal choices relating to a healthy lifestyle. Students who excel in their sport of choice are also given the opportunity to explore avenues for representative selection to Regional, State and National levels.

Opportunities available

Students have the opportunity to compete in athletics, basketball, cross country, golf, mountain biking, netball, rugby, tennis, touch football, triathlon, soccer and softball. They also participate in three interhouse sports carnivals throughout the year including swimming, cross country and athletics. Representing Charlton, Dobell and Shortland houses, students enjoy these interhouse rivalries in a collegial and spirited manner. Our MC Sport and Recreation Centre features international standard flooring, competition infrastructure, additional learning spaces and mixed-use fitness zones. The centre serves as an additional resource for teams' training and competing across a variety of sports, while also accommodating regular PDHPE classes. They are encouraged to participate in a variety of programs in order to experience active and healthy lifestyles

After school sports

Several outside sporting bodies hire our sports facilities after school and many of these are available to Macquarie College families for an additional fee. Some of the sports offered in the last several years have included futsal, basketball, football and tennis.



Wellbeing

Chaplaincy

Macquarie College has built an environment that nurtures the growth of every student, supporting academic excellence, social wellbeing and spiritual awareness.

This is the cornerstone of Senior School and is encouraged by our Chaplaincy department. Each Friday, Senior School students meet for a Chapel service in the campus church. This program runs for approximately 45 minutes and may include an icebreaker, prayer, presentation of work, musical items, drama and a message.

Guest speakers also feature and share reflections on Bible stories. Week of Worship (WOW) is a special week occurring in the first and third terms of the year. With a session timetabled for each day, it features interesting guest speakers and includes songs, activities and a themed approach to encouraging faith.



Counselling

Our College counsellors service all school years, and play a pivotal role in helping students who may be experiencing challenges in their school or home environments. They can provide short-term counselling or therapy, advocacy and support, referrals to specialists, group work, professional development for teachers, as well as information and support for parents and caregivers. Our College counsellors help students deal with difficult issues such as loss and grief, family conflict, child protection, bullying, transition through key phases and mental health.

Referrals can be made via the Student Services Office, or to a College counsellor directly.



MC Learn

MC Learn is part of the expansive Wellbeing Department at Macquarie College. We understand that all students have been created as unique individuals and, for some, the learning journey may be more challenging.

Our MC Learn team collaborates with parents, students and teachers to develop individualised plans to support our young people in their learning journey.

Support is available for students with physical, social, emotional or intellectual challenges, and is based on an inclusive model which allows for these students to remain a part of day-to-day classroom activities.



Child safe program

Our Child Safe Program is based on the NSW government child safe standards. When you open the 'About Us' section of our college website you will find the public facing documents which make up our Child Safe Program. The public facing documents include a Child Safe Policy, the Codes of Conduct for adults and for young people. Along with these there is a process of reporting any incidents/concerns that may arise. The other public facing documents assist in the management process of investigating the evidence and resolving the issues associated with the incidents or concerns.

Our Child Safe Program provides us all with a transparent process to keep our children/young people safe. It is the responsibility of the whole school/college community to know about these public facing documents so we can assist in keeping our children and young people safe.

Lockers

Each student in Senior School will be given the use of a locker. Each student must provide their own lock. The locker is to be kept locked at all times. Students finding damage to their locker should report the matter to Student Services immediately. Students damaging lockers will be required to meet the cost of replacement or repair and may lose the privilege of having a locker. Damage to school property, e.g. textbooks due to locker misuse, will be charged to students. The College will not assume responsibility for students' personal equipment that may be damaged or lost as a result of a locker not being locked properly.

Bring Your Own Technology (BYOT)

The BYOT program is compulsory for all Senior School Students. Students will be expected to each bring a device, with appropriate software, that will connect to the College Wi-Fi network. Headphones should also be brought from home.

The device remains the property of the student/parent, with insurance also remaining a responsibility of the parent. Software becomes a personal choice (the cloud is a free solution for everyone).

Camps & outdoor education

The Macquarie College Camps and Outdoor Education Program focuses on developing our students' communication, decision making, problem solving, mental toughness, team building, leadership and self confidence.

Each Senior School year level will have the opportunity to attend a camp each year, and each camp is designed to positively enhance a student's education through the promotion of relational and social development, experiential learning opportunities, the facing of one's fears through challenge by choice activities, the enrichment of community within their cohort, as well as an opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of Christian values and teaching.

Our 2024 camps were:

- Year 7 - Southern Highlands
- Year 8 - Blue Mountains (held locally due to flooding)
- Year 9 - Namadgi National Park
- Year 10 - Sydney
- Year 11 - Jindabyne & Sydney
- Year 12 - Nepal

Our 2025 camps will be announced early in 2025.

Through increased wellbeing and life skills, the Macquarie College Camps & Outdoor Education Program seeks to equip students for adult life in an increasingly complex world.



Rights & responsibilities of students

Rights

- I have the right to be safe.
- I have the right to expect my property to be safe.
- I have the right to obtain maximum benefit from all lessons and classes. Other students should not deprive me of this by their behaviour.
- I have the right to not have my health jeopardised in any way.
- I have the right to have pleasant, clean and well-maintained grounds.
- I have the right to be provided with a College in which I am not in any physical danger. When defects occur, they will be fixed.
- I have the right to expect the local community to support, respect and have pride in the College.
- I have the right to be helped to learn self-control.
- I have the right to expect that all my rights will be mine so long as I attend to my full responsibilities.

Responsibilities

- I have the responsibility to make the College safe by not threatening, hitting or causing harm to anyone.
- I have the responsibility not to steal, damage or destroy the property of others, and to take good care of my own property.
- I have the responsibility to cooperate with teachers and other students to make sure that lessons proceed and that I keep up-to-date with required work. I will not behave so as to interfere with other students' rights to learn. I also have the responsibility to be punctual, to attend school regularly and to take part in activities that will be of benefit to me. I have the responsibility to bring required books and equipment for each lesson.
- I have the responsibility not to jeopardise the health of others by smoking, vaping, taking alcohol or drugs; and I have the responsibility not to encourage others in this way.
- I have the responsibility to care for the College environment - to keep it neat and clean and to be prepared to remove litter.
- I have the responsibility of telling teachers about defective buildings and facilities.
- I have the responsibility to behave so that the community will respect and have pride in the College.
- I have the responsibility to wear my College uniform in a way that brings honour to the College.
- I have the responsibility to learn self-control.
- I have the responsibility to protect my rights and the rights of others by carrying out my responsibilities at all times.
